Fiber optic pigtails can have a single core, multiple cores (such as 2, 4, 6, or 12), or be part of ribbon bundles containing 12 cores.

Fiber optic pigtails are short optical fibers with a pre-installed connector on one end and a bare fiber on the other, designed for splicing into larger fiber cables or connecting to optical devices . The number of cores in a pigtail depends on its type and application: Single-core pigtails: Contain one optical fiber and are commonly used for standard single-mode or multimode connections . Multi-core pigtails: Available in dual-core, 4-core, 6-core, or 12-core configurations, often bundled together for efficient splicing and distribution in Optical Distribution Frames (ODFs) or terminal boxes . Ribbon pigtails: Typically consist of 12 cores arranged in a flat ribbon, allowing simultaneous splicing of multiple fibers, which is ideal for high-density network installations . The choice of core count depends on network requirements, space constraints, and the type of fiber (single-mode or multimode). Single-mode pigtails are usually yellow, while multimode pigtails are orange or aqua, and the core count can be selected to match the fiber cable being terminated . In summary, a fiber optic pigtail can range from 1 core to 12 cores or more in bundled or ribbon configurations, providing flexibility for various optical network applications .
